- **Evening Gathering** I am really pleased that the evening gathering has finally found its unique style in creating a space to pause and receive. Numbers have grown during 2022 and I sense that this space will be important for meeting and encountering the Holy Spirit.
- Carol Service despite the Artic conditions it was great to welcome the local community, sing some carols and eat lots of mince pies!
- Community Acts of Remembrance 2022 has been a significant year for the world as we watched in horror the war in Ukraine unfold and grieved the loss of our Queen. It was therefore important that we created a space for people to respond and I am grateful for all those who made these acts of remembrance happen. It's so important to connect with our local community.

All this would not have happened without you, your support and prayers, thank you! I would also like to especially thank Jason Rowles, the leadership team and the trustees who work very hard behind the scenes, who support me and continue to be passionate about our vision.

There are challenges with the wide age range in both groups. The hope would be that we have enough leaders to cater well for all ages. Space is sometimes an issue with our growing numbers (a nice problem to have). We have a brilliant team of leaders and helpers and it's exciting to be part of this wonderful ministry - helping children learn more about and connect with Jesus.



WAKE UP

We've had some great feedback including the simplicity of the messages. My favourite is when someone described it as 'Fun church'.

It's accessible, easy to invite your friends to and hopefully an entry point to other church activities. I'm excited to see it growing and feeding into things like Alpha courses or just the other Sunday gatherings.





PASTORAL

Pastoral Contact Team

The Pastoral Contact Team was established during the first national lockdown in 2020, and whilst we are no longer subject to the restrictions brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic, we continue to see this as an important element of our pastoral care system. The team consists of people who are committed to keeping in contact monthly with the people on their list, just to chat and to offer to pray with them, and to pray for them regularly. This year, as we grew in number as a church, we put out an appeal for more people to come forward and support this mission and the team now comprises 16 people, an increase of 5 over the previous year. Over the course of the year, arising pastoral concerns have been shared with me as the Pastoral Coordinator and with the Church Leader as appropriate, in order that additional support could be provided. As more mid-week communities are established, (see below), the Pastoral Contact Team remains an important means of ensuring that we are still connecting regularly with those who are perhaps more on the fringes of our church. The pastoral care of the team is very important and is overseen by me as the Pastoral Coordinator. In November 2022 we had our latest get together to examine what pastoral care is about and to pray with and for each other and similar events will continue to be arranged at regular intervals in the coming year.

WhatsApp Prayer Circle

The WhatsApp prayer circle consists of 7 people who have committed to pray for pastoral needs among our community as and when they arise. With the permission of the person concerned, brief details of the issue are shared and individuals then pray. Over the course of 2022, we have continued to see some amazing answers to prayer and we faithfully expect to see more in the coming year!

Meals Rotas

At important points in the lives of members of our church community we offer to provide meals for up to two weeks. Over the course of 2022 we have supported those who have had new babies, as well as those who have had periods out of action following illness or surgery and as ever, this has been so well received. We continue to be alert to opportunities to widen this beyond those with an immediate connection to STB as a means of outreach. We see this as an important aspect of our generosity as a church and will continue this in 2023.

Mid-week Communities

It has always been our intention that the majority of pastoral care will take place within mid-week communities and I am delighted that following the establishment of our first group during 2022, a second group emerged during the summer of 2022 that eventually became a Ladies' Alpha Course. This group now continues to meet regularly and there is some amazing pastoral care taking place among the members of that group. At the time of writing, a third group, a Men's Alpha Course, is just starting up and it is my prayer that this will also become firmly established and continue to grow in 2023. In addition, a Men's Social Group has been set up through WhatsApp and is another important source of pastoral contact and support. Again, at the time of writing, a women's group is beginning to emerge who meet for walks periodically and I look forward to seeing how this will develop and grow over the coming year.

Conclusion

2022 was a year of real growth for STB, in numbers of people, but also in terms of depth of relationships. It has been really encouraging to widen the team involved in pastoral care and to see the great work being done in the communities that are beginning to be established, outside of Sunday gatherings. My prayer for 2023 is that this will continue, that people will feel more connected, despite larger numbers, and that all will go deeper in their relationships with each other and with God.

OPERATION MANAGERS REPORT

Sunday Gatherings

One of my responsibilities as Ops Manager at STB is to ensure that all of our gatherings can happen, and the fact that we are a 'pop-up Church' means we have to heavily rely on 'team'. Every single week I'm blown away by the amount of time people give and the amount of bodies it actually takes for us to put on a Sunday gathering. We simply couldn't do what we do without you, so thank you!

2022 was most definitely a year of growth which is fantastic. But as we grow, we also discovered that we need more space, to put more chairs out, to serve more refreshments, to accommodate larger kids groups, more time after our gatherings for people to chat and pray for each other.

We also needed to store more kit at The Arc where space is already tight. Fortunately, we have a really strong relationship with The Arc and they were happy for us to install an outside lockable unit for some extra storage.

We finally got our contactless payment machine to make it easy for people to make one off donations to support the work of STB and this is now set up for every 10am gathering.

We continue to live stream most of our gatherings (we are still learning about tech all the time!) and I know that there are many people who either watch live when they can't be there in person, or catch up later in the week.

As I look forward to 2023 I already know that one of my biggest challenges is to grow our teams so we can as a Church, continue to serve our gatherings well, as they grow in number, so this is my hope and prayer!

Seasonal Socials

These are such valuable times that we spend together as a Church community and also a great opportunity for us to invite friends or family who don't come to Church. Our Autumn social was really popular again in 2022, as we set up an outdoor cinema for the kids and served hot dogs, drinks and treats to all who came. A really lovely time to chat and catch up around the fire pits.

We also had a few summer socials during our time of abiding and we're really grateful to those who hosted these.

In 2023 we are already planning a spring social which could also become a regular in the diary.



SAFEGUARDING

At STB we are committed to the safeguarding, care and nurture of everyone within our community, and as such we will:

- · Promote a safer environment and culture.
- Safely recruit and support all those with any responsibility related to children and vulnerable adults within the Church.
- Respond promptly to every safeguarding concern or allegation.
- Care pastorally for victims/survivors of abuse and other affected persons.
- Care pastorally for those who are the subject of concerns or allegations of abuse and other affected persons.
- Respond to those that may pose a present risk to others.

Safeguarding Officer

Ian Craig is the Safeguarding Officer for St. Barnabas Church, Grange Park, Loughborough, and has been in this position since September 2019 when the church was planted.

The role of the Safeguarding Officer is to be the named person to whom volunteers and church members would report any disclosures or child protection concerns.

If required, the Safeguarding Officer will refer any disclosures or child protection concerns to the Diocese.

The role is regularly communicated within the church to ensure church members are aware of who they should approach with any concerns. Information on the Safeguarding Officer can be found on the website, information banners are visible at every service, and slides are shown during live streaming of services.

Safeguarding Sunday

20 November 2022 was Safeguarding Sunday. This was marked in our gathering by showing a video highlighting the importance of safeguarding and the fact that it is everyone's responsibility. There was also an interview with the Safeguarding Officer, giving further explanation of our approach towards safeguarding at STB and resources from the Diocese of Leicester were used to help children engage with this important topic.

As a leadership we encourage all members of the STB community to complete the 'Safeguarding Basic Awareness Training' session. As the name suggests, the course provides a basic knowledge of safeguarding in order to keep people safe in the church community, as members of STB. The course is completed online using the Church of England Safeguarding Portal, and can be completed in your own time.

For volunteers working with children and/or vulnerable adults we request that the 'Safeguarding Foundation Training' be completed.

Volunteers/DBS checks

All volunteers working with the youth and kids team have a DBS check prior to undertaking their role. DBS checks are renewed every five years.

There are currently seven volunteers working with youth and kids who have been DBS checked.

There are currently two volunteers for youth and kids work, whose DBS check is being processed.

In addition to youth and kids work, all Trustees are required to be DBS checked, and there are currently two recently appointed STB Trustees whose checks are under way.

Disclosures

There have been three instances of disclosure to the STB Safeguarding team since the last AGM.

Two instances were reviewed internally, and no advice was sought with the Diocese Safeguarding team, but details have been securely recorded.

One instance was reported to the Diocese, but no further action was taken, again details have been securely recorded.

Conclusion

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Acting on your concerns or seeking advice is rarely a bad idea. People often question 'What if I'm wrong' but we have to also ask ourselves 'what if I'm right'. We can't assume that someone else has seen what we may have seen or will pass on concerns. I am always willing to be asked for advice around any concerns.:

This physical act of giving and particularly 'Give to Give Away' embraces so much of the heart of STB, I am excited to see how this continues to develop in 2023.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The financial reporting period is from when STB was established as a charity in July 2021 to end of 2022. This includes the transition of banking arrangements from Emmanuel accounts to STB's own bank account which was first available in May 2022.

General fund donations for the reporting period are £35,602 plus £7,580 associated gift aid. For the calendar year of 2022, donations were £26,733 with gift aid of £5,973. Gift aid has been claimed where possible and represents 22% of donations. Donations income has grown steadily from approximately £1,500 per month from 12 named donor to approximately £2,500 per month from over 20 named donors.

Thanks to everyone who gives so generously to the church!

Significant expenditure items are staffing, gathering and worship costs. Total general fund expenditure was £70,495 and total income was £70,672 including grant funding of £27,490 from start-up and continuing SDF grants.

Trustees have agreed a budget for 2023 with an in-year deficit of £12,000, which reduces to £4,000 after applying the residual of our start-up grant. Trustees seek to raise income in by approximately £4,000 to cover the anticipated deficit in 2023 and then set a balanced budget in 2024.

YOUR STORE

Shelthorpe Your Store is a pop-up shop hosted at the Good Shepherd Church Hall every Saturday from 11am to 12noon. The shop has been running since November 2021. The items for sale come from John Storer House (JSH) and donations. JSH has a permanent Your Store in their building and it is funded by the Charnwood Borough Council.

Residents in the Shelthorpe area who are struggling financially can become a member of Shelthorpe Your Store. Every time they come, they pay a flat fee of £3, which gives them a shop of fresh produce, meat, dairy products, tins, and other essentials. Over the past 12 months (Mar 2022 to Feb 2023) the average number of people/families coming to Shelthorpe Your Store every Saturday is a modest increase from last year.

We thank God for the work of Shelthorpe Your Store which alleviates in a small way the financial worries of some local residents and it provides a safe environment for them to socialise. We also want to thank volunteers from the Good Shepherd Church and STB who make it all possible.

The immediate future of Shelthorpe Your Store beyond March 2023 is to continue in its present form. May the good work continue.
